I first want to thank Christ Lutheran Church for your warm welcome and the expressions of sympathy around the sudden death of my canine companion, Boo Boo Bear. Coming as it has during my integration into your congregation has helped me to see something of God's plan in its timing. Since most of you have experienced the pain of losing a beloved pet, you can appreciate what this support has meant to me.

When I said in my first sermon that I would need your support as we swam together into the waters of transition, little did I know how quickly the "buddy system" would be needed. I truly come to you as a wounded healer.

Now my service as your Transitional Pastor begins. For those who may not be aware of the specifics of what is expected from a Transitional Pastor, I am listing these here for your consideration. While there are the usual expectations one would have for any Pastor such as preparation and implementation of Sunday worship and care for the pastoral needs of the congregation, Intentional Transitional Pastors have specific training and skills for assisting congregations with a variety of other tasks which have been outlined as the 5 Interim Tasks. These are:

1. Come to terms with history:
 - Recognize that the former pastor has departed, so that relationship can no longer be the same;
 - See that this is a good time to come to terms with elements of history thus far avoided or denied;
 - Grieve and celebrate the past in preparation for a richer, freer future.



2. Clarify the identity of the congregation:
 - Claim a new awareness of self that is independent of previous pastoral leadership;
 - Update the congregation's sense of who they are as a changing, growing people of God in a changing world.
3. Respond positively to changes in leadership/power dynamics:
 - Allow alternative leadership to come to the fore constructively;
 - Support and nurture growth in old and new leadership.
4. Rethink denominational ties:
 - Look to the denomination for helpful resources, especially with respect to the pastoral call process;
 - Make use of the denomination as a spiritual and practical community of support.
5. Build commitment for new pastoral leadership and a renewed vision for the future.

In the months ahead we will endeavor to pursue these tasks with the help of the Transitional Pastor Steering Committee and the Holy Spirit.

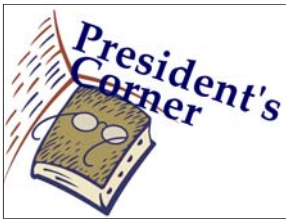

COMMENTS ON THE MARSHALL PLAN

Most of us remember the end of World War II in 1945. Americans sacrificed much, especially those who served in the military. This country faced almost overwhelming crises - but none more staggering than what to do with (or to) the people of Germany, Japan, and Italy. History taught us that "to the victors belongs the spoils" - and we needed only to read the Old Testament to find supportive examples of this dictum.

Fortunately General George Marshall stepped in with a plan to win over these former enemies that was unique in the annals of warfare. Instead of raping and pillaging our former enemies, we would gain more by helping them to rebuild their countries and to revitalize their economies - thus was born The Marshall Plan.

Subsequently the Marshall Plan has become the foundation of U.S. foreign policy worldwide, and the



U.S. has become the primary force for good in our world. Now, we face many situations similar to the end of WW II - military personnel reentering civilian life, an economy in crisis (ours and the worlds), and a need to invest our resources to ensure the survival of the world as we know it.

A rebirth of the Marshall Plan would call for the U.S. to provide additional assistance in the areas of poverty and starvation - a helping hand.

YOU can help. There is a series of bills pending in committee's of the House and Senate that address this issue. These may never reach the floor of Congress or the desk of the President. It is time to write your Senators and Congressmen urging them to increase support for the eradication of poverty and starvation both in the U.S. and worldwide. I have learned it's okay to take care of me, too

After three hospital stays over the last six months, I realized that what used to work as far as my health care was concerned needed to be reevaluated. Since one of the powerful tools in healing is knowledge, I called on health care professionals to help set up a plan in terms of nutrition, exercise, medications, and stress management.

I've learned that life style changes are not easy and even though the old behaviors were not healthy, they are familiar and easy to slip back into. However, I am determined to keep trying.

I have learned that it is not selfish to take care of myself, and that I do not always have to feel guilty about saying no. I have learned it is okay to rest when I am tired and to give myself permission to do nothing.

I have learned to be my own advocate and not to dismiss my symptoms just because they are not as severe as someone else's, or the illness is not as serious. If it is a new symptom and it persists, it



needs to be checked out, all this without becoming paranoid.

I've learned the aging process can be a challenge, however, I do not have to go through it alone. It is okay to ask for help, in fact it is a relief not to have to always do it myself.

I feel that we are blessed to have a Stephen Ministry program at Christ Lutheran Church. These caring women and men are willing to walk with us when we are experiencing difficulties. I am personally grateful for their concern, support, and prayers during my own illness.

While there are many support groups that are helpful, the Stephen Ministry program is Christ centered. The power of prayers and constant reminders of God's love for us can be a huge factor in the healing process.

Our mission at Christ Lutheran is to be a caring community of the baptized people of God, saved by the gift of grace through the sacrifice of His Son, Jesus Christ. Empowered by the Holy Spirit, we are sent into the world to share the Good News of God's love through our words and actions.

You had an opportunity to look at the Personal Guide in church this past weekend and to consider how small Forward Steps can – when taken together – augment our ministry here at Christ Lutheran.

Soaring is the joy that springs from hope, and our hope is in the Lord. We **soar** when we attend worship service because we know it's time well spent. We **soar** when we pray and study God's Word because it strengthens our spirit.

We **soar** because we give of our time, talent, and resources to enable the work of our ministry to go forward. We **soar** because we serve, help others, and give back.

In the past year we've accomplished many things together:

1. Increased the number of people pledging by 9% with a pledged amount increase of 17.4%
2. Expanded and increased educational and spiritual growth opportunities
3. Encouraged participation in the Good Samaritan Chapel Legacy Fund.
4. Purchased a new organ

Yet our mission is not complete here at Christ Lutheran Church. We are a work in progress. In the coming year, there are some things we would like to do. The following goals are just a few of what we hope to accomplish this next year to augment our mission and ministry:

1. Increase percentage giving by at least 10% for the continuation of our program and ministry development
2. Write a lease for a new high-speed, multi-functional, color copier
3. Replace 3 church computers
4. Update and expand the capabilities of the audio visual system
5. Replace the \$4800 in the Capital Reserves account spent in 2009 for parking lot resurfacing and re-striping to bring the account back up to \$10,000



Look at the Forward Step suggestions on the Personal Guide you have received. The purpose of this guide is to help us reflect on our giving with suggestions that are within most budgets. A Forward Step is small, but if taken by the majority of us, it is a big,

big step for our church. With it we help *sustain* the work of our church over the next year and together we grow the grace of giving.

But, if possible, consider a Step of Faith. In many cases it's not much more than a Forward Step, yet enables us to grow and serve God even more.

Please take time to think about your blessings and ask God to lead you in your offering. Remember these are suggestions only. As always, your offering is between you and God.

September 5/6, you will receive an offering card. One per household will be in the Narthex on tables for you to pick up. Baskets for your pledge card return will be placed at the altar end of the aisles for your use as you go up to receive communion.

One important thing you can do that really helps us, no matter what your offering, is to return the card. It is one of the most noble things you can do to help us plan God's work for the year ahead. We all need to **Soar** together with our time, talents and resources for our church's continued ministries.

While churches do need money to operate, stewardship is about more than balancing the budget. Stewardship is a spiritual issue. God has provided for and will continue to provide for our every need. During October you shall receive a *Stewardship-In-Action* form on which you can volunteer your time and talents for our church's mission and ministry. Please choose your personal journey for 2010 within the church and deposit it in the basket at the altar end of the aisle as a portion of your pledge.

Failure to give of your time and talents graciously reflects only one thing – a lack of faith. God wants your heart, 100 percent. God asks for a token 10 percent of our treasure, knowing that where our treasure is, there will our heart be also. When our treasure is spent on God and family, our hearts are full. Given our shaky economy, this could be a tough year. But remember to take care of your heart.

Your generosity in the past has produced this wonderful church building. But more importantly, your generosity has given more than its share to benefit those who are in need of funds and of faith. Thank you all so very much.

He has showed you O Man, what is good. And what does the Lord require of you? To act justly and to love mercy and to walk humbly with your God. (The New International Bible; Micah 6:8)

No, the Lord has told us what is good. What he requires of us is this: to do what is just, to show constant love, and to live in humble fellowship with our God. (The Good News Bible; Micah 6:8)

But he's already made it plain how to live, what to do, what God is looking for in men and women. It is quite simple: Do what is fair and just to your neighbor, be compassionate and loyal in your love, and do not take yourself too seriously - take God seriously. (The Message Bible; Micah 6:8)



The prophet Micah was a contemporary of Isaiah and was from the country town of Judah in the southern Kingdom. Passages from Micah are worthy of note and many were predictions about what was to come. Micah (6:8) summarized much of what the prophets of Israel had said about how we are to live.

The Bible is a collection of texts written by different people and was written long ago in Hebrew, Aramaic, and Greek. It was later translated into Latin and other languages. Some of these languages did not have words or phrases for the specific passages being translated and so the men and women who wrote for the Bible had to "summarize" or use their own ideas of what was being said. Men and women who translated the Bible into many different languages had to do the

same. We believe that the Bible is the inspired word of God written by human beings. We believe when you read the Bible that God wants you to use it as a tool for understanding His teachings and to use it to learn to live as He wants us to live.

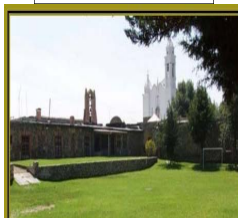
For us, this verse is quite clear no matter what translation you read. If we are to live our lives with justice, then we must not judge others for what they do. We are to leave that to God since He is the only one who truly knows what is in a person's heart and mind. Our neighbor is everyone besides ourselves. So, don't listen to the news media, or the others in your life who spend all their time gossiping but let God handle these things. Do not take yourself so seriously and believe that you are the only one who knows how others should think and live, but take God seriously and know that you need to look to yourself and read the Bible, go to church and support it with time and talents, and, finally, spend time each day in prayer so that you can live as God wants YOU and only YOU (do not judge others) to live.

REMEMBER: Meanwhile these three remain: faith, hope, and love: and the **GREATEST OF THESE IS LOVE!** - 1 Corinthians 13:15.
